

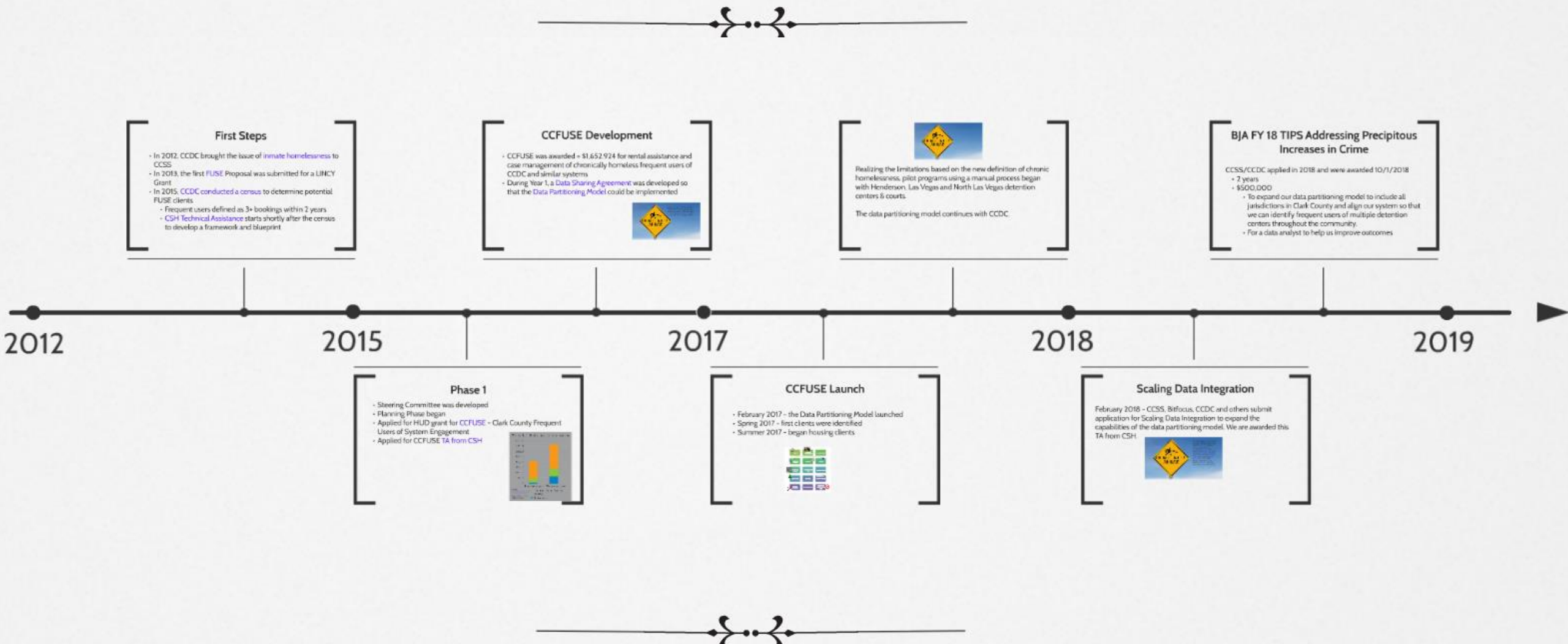
Programs to Address Frequent Users of our Public Systems

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- **FUSE** – Frequent Users of System Engagement
- **STAR PSH** – Stability, Tenancy, Access, Restore Permanent Supportive Housing
- **STAR TH-RRH** – Stability, Tenancy, Access, Restore Transitional Housing and Rapid Rehousing Program
- **TIPS** – Technology Innovation for Public Safety





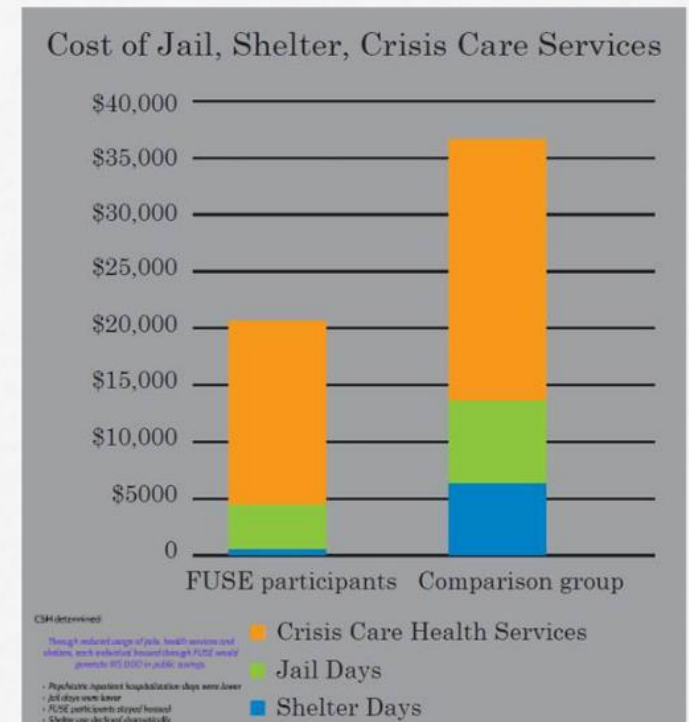
First Steps

- In 2012, CCDC brought the issue of inmate homelessness to CCSS
- In 2013, the first FUSE Proposal was submitted for a LINCY Grant
- In 2015, CCDC conducted a census to determine potential FUSE clients
 - Frequent users defined as 3+ bookings within 2 years
 - CSH Technical Assistance starts shortly after the census to develop a framework and blueprint

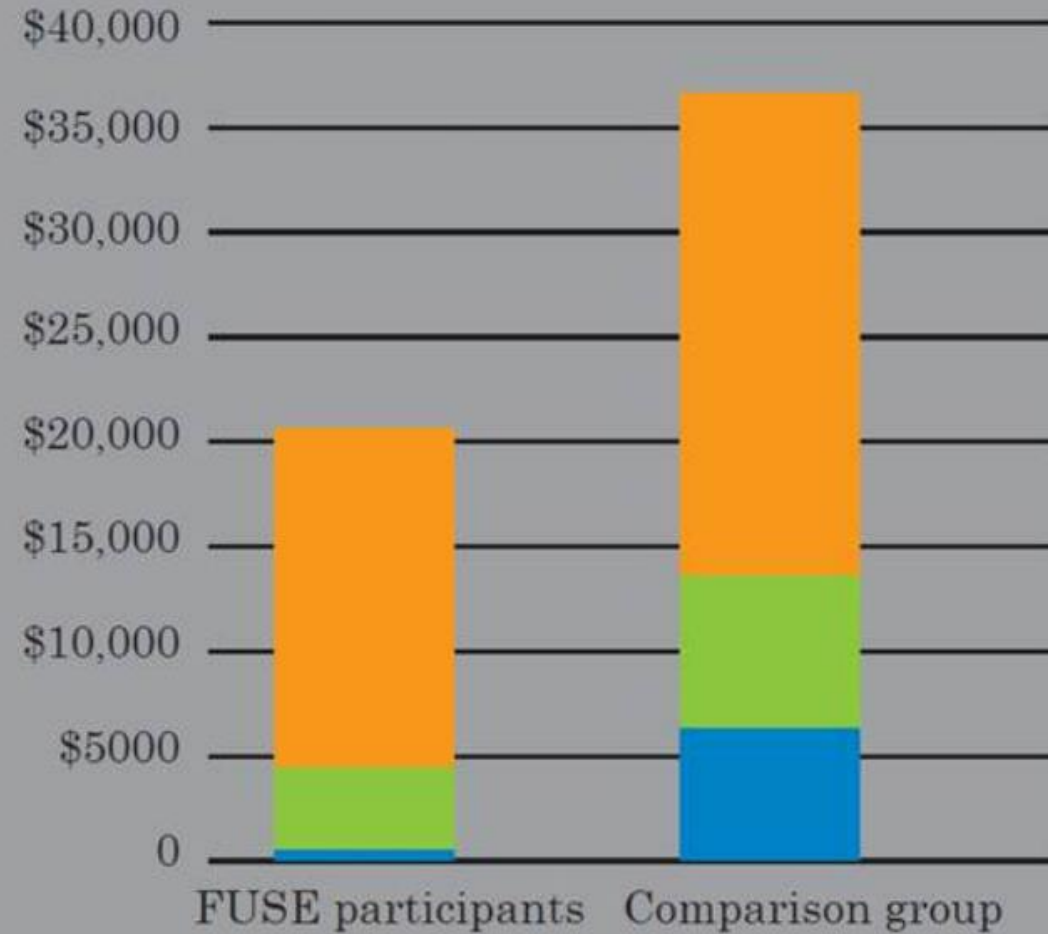


Phase 1

- Steering Committee was developed
- Planning Phase began
- Applied for HUD grant for **CCFUSE** - Clark County Frequent Users of System Engagement
- Applied for CCFUSE **TA from CSH**



Cost of Jail, Shelter, Crisis Care Services



CSH determined:

Through reduced usage of jails, health services and shelters, each individual housed through FUSE would generate \$15,000 in public savings.

- Psychiatric inpatient hospitalization days were lower
- Jail days were lower
- FUSE participants stayed housed
- Shelter use declined dramatically

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CCFUSE Development

- CCFUSE was awarded = \$1,652,924 for rental assistance and case management of chronically homeless frequent users of CCDC and similar systems
- During Year 1, a **Data Sharing Agreement** was developed so that the **Data Partitioning Model** could be implemented



HUD's definition of chronic homelessness changes. Moving forward, in order to meet the definition of chronic homelessness and qualify for CCFUSE PSH, inmates need to have been homeless for 12+ months and have a disabling condition. If a client is in jail for more than 89 days, they lose their homeless status.



CCFUSE Launch

- February 2017 - the Data Partitioning Model launched
- Spring 2017 - first clients were identified
- Summer 2017 - began housing clients







Realizing the limitations based on the new definition of chronic homelessness, pilot programs using a manual process began with Henderson, Las Vegas and North Las Vegas detention centers & courts.

The data partitioning model continues with CCDC.



Scaling Data Integration

February 2018 - CCSS, Bitfocus, CCDC and others submit application for Scaling Data Integration to expand the capabilities of the data partitioning model. We are awarded this TA from CSH.



CHALLENGES AHEAD

The tool is developed.



The CCFUSE application with HUD is rewritten and approved. It is now called **STAR TH-RRH** (Stability, Tenancy, Access, Restore Transitional Housing - Rapid Rehousing) for **frequent users** who are **literally homeless** at the time of arrest. Services include **short-term housing** (up to 2 years) and **case management**. Chronically homeless frequent users may qualify for **STAR PSH** and other PSH programs in our community.

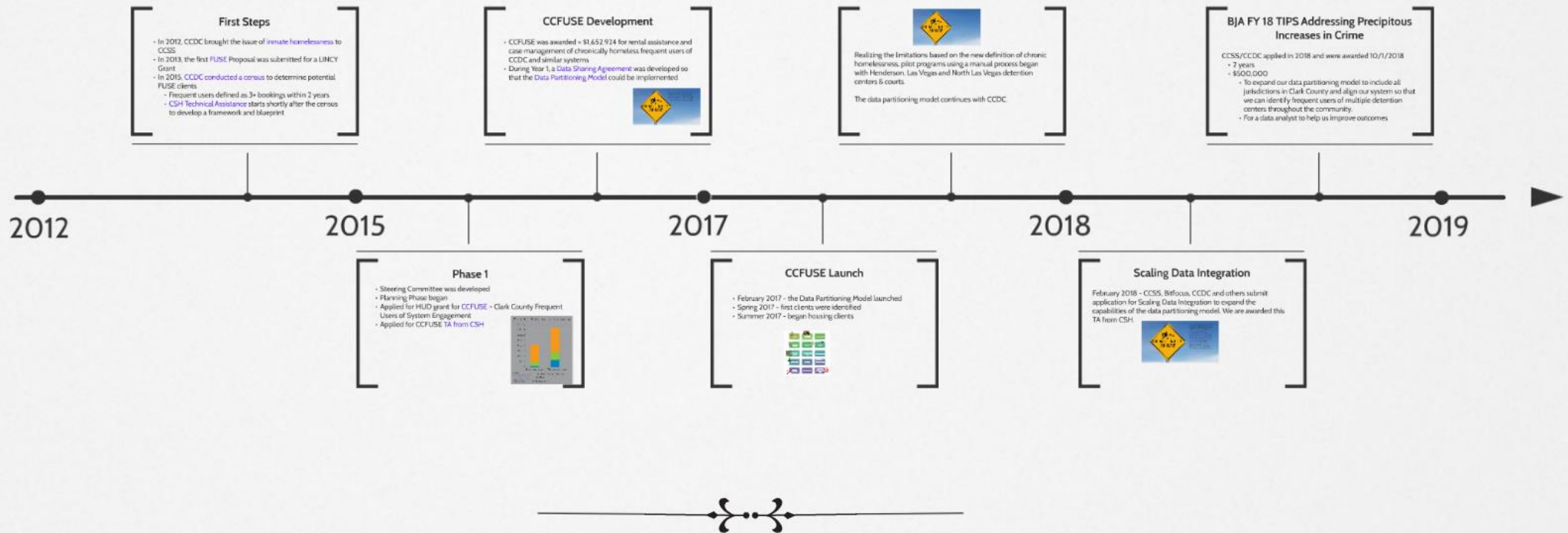


BJA FY 18 TIPS Addressing Precipitous Increases in Crime

CCSS/CCDC applied in 2018 and were awarded 10/1/2018

- 2 years
- \$500,000
 - To expand our data partitioning model to include all jurisdictions in Clark County and align our system so that we can identify frequent users of multiple detention centers throughout the community.
 - For a data analyst to help us improve outcomes





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
